The project goal is to help people turn their lives around, by the choices they make and help them to address and resolve personal issues which have led them to a potential criminal situation.



Project Rise is a restorative practice intervention which, in the right circumstances, can be used as an alternative engagement model to provide another solution to a recurring problem.

Local Sourcing

We are excited to say Christmas has landed, with some great products arriving in stores. Look out for family favourites and be tempted by something new, too.

With the known supply and driver shortage challenges across the UK, we continue to utilise multiple supply partnerships to help service our stores θ customer needs.

Local sourcing is set in the overall context of the food strategy. It is all about building on top of the core offer, with products tailored locally to the tastes of our customers. Our championing of Scottish bakers, for example, has been important to the viability of the industry, gives customers a quality product and, in turn, supports our local communities. Where possible, we also work with local distribution partners to consolidate deliveries and reduce overall food miles.

We expect Christmas & Hogmanay 2021 to be bigger than ever, with many looking to celebrate across multiple days and events.

Trialling New Concepts

Further to the trial of Amazon Lockers in selected stores last year, the service has been rolled out to a further 40 stores across the Scotmid estate.

In line with upcoming Government legislation, work continues toward the integration of Reverse Vending Machines. Units are being trialled in South Queensferry and Kirkliston stores, with plans to trial a further two new concepts in East Calder and Renton.

The Protection Of Workers Act

Gavin Randell, Retail Operations Director, met Scotland's Community Safety Minister, Ash Denham, Edinburgh Southern MSP, Daniel Johnson, and SGF Chief Executive, Dr Pete Cheema, at our Leven Street store to welcome The Protection of Workers Act.

The Protection of Workers Act, which came into force in August, is a law long called for by retailers and welcomed by the Scottish Grocers' Federation (SGF), which supported Edinburgh Southern MSP Daniel Johnson as his Bill was unanimously passed by the Scottish Parliament.



SGF have since launched its Don't Put Up With It Campaign to encourage everyone in retail to take a zero-tolerance stance and contact police.

Scotmid has been a prominent supporter of the Don't Put Up With It campaign, displaying banners in a number of its stores. It is also supported by the Scottish Government, Police Scotland, Crimestoppers and has led to the bosses of hundreds of convenience stores across the country pledging to report every crime.

Gavin Randell, said: "As a community convenience retailer with a sizeable presence across Scotland, Scotmid welcomes the new legislation to protect our colleagues from violence and abuse."

Over 108,000 deliveries have been made this year across the central belt of Scotland.

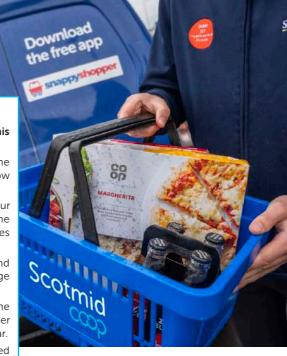
Our delivery service provided through the Snappy shopper platform, continues to grow and expand to other areas.

A 15th hub was added to the service from our Kilmarnock store in September, covering the vast majority of East Ayrshire. Two more stores are scheduled to join by the end of this year

The range of products has been expanded, and for our Broxburn and Uddingston stores, a range from the instore butcher is available

The Armadale hub has been a finalist in both the Convenience Retail Awards and Scottish Grocer Awards for Customer Delivery Store of the Year.

Food to Go

The Kitchen at Scotmid offering has continued to go from strength to strength.

Continued investment has seen nine stores benefitting from full refurbishment of their offer. In addition, 20 stores have benefitted from the installation of new self-cleaning Rational ovens. Fifty counters now have digital screens along with other upgrades.

We have also continued to roll out our Pizza Art concept to a further six stores, an authentic Rome-style

pizza made-to-order to more customers. Our range has also continued to evolve, with new launches of salad bowls, noodle pots, smoothies, limited edition burgers and dessert bars. Our award winning Pizza Sandwich, which scooped the New Food To Go Award at the Sammies Awards 2021, can now be found in more stores

New seasonal products include a Pigs in Blankets breakfast roll, Pigs in Blankets baguette and, not forgetting, our tasty dessert bar including a full range of amazing Big Al's Balmoral Burger in time for St Andrews Day.

Electronic Shelf Labels

More Scotmid customers are set to benefit from clearer product pricing and information thanks to investment into new electronic shelf labels (ESLs)

The integrated technology, designed to display accurate pricing and promotion information – as well as extended information such as allergens and country of origin – allows customers to make easy and informed decisions on their product purchases. Colleagues are able to accurately change and update product information quickly and easily.

Trial stores have experienced increased store efficiency, improved pricing and product information compliance, reduced paper wastage and an enhanced store team morale. There are now plans to install in stores across the estate.

The investment comes at a time when Scotmid are looking to drive store change through technology and adopt sustainable practices that reduce the need for paper usage.

Allan Robertson Programme Manager, Innovation and Change, said: "As a retailer based in the heart of communities we serve, we



continually look for innovative solutions which will deliver genuine benefits for our customers as well as our colleagues. These electronic labels look tidy and modern and mean that we can present our price and product information more clearly for customers.

"In locations where installation has already taken place, our store teams are delighted by the improvement in time efficiencies, as they remove the burden of repetitive manual price and promotion tasks and deliver a more streamlined approach, helping to assist and serve customers."

Angela Murray, Treasurer, Co-Manager and a Senior Advisor with CABIA, "This award will allow us to not just continue our current service but to develop the community cohesion and involvement side of our service following recent Covid19 pandemic restrictions being lifted by fully utilising our Community Room, Community Garden and kitchen facilities to improve the life of many by reducing isolation, providing opportunities to engage with others in similar circumstances, build positive and supportive relationships and allow people to interact and socialise in a warm welcoming environment. We also will provide access to a lending library for DVD's, CD's and books."

St Andrews First Aid Partnership Continues

St Andrews First Aid is Scotland's only dedicated first aid charity. Scotmid's latest donation will enable the charity to buy new uniforms for its volunteers.

Scotmid has been funding St Andrew's uniforms since 2015. In 2017, Scotmid also funded the acquisition of 15 new bikes and uniforms, safety equipment and video cameras for the charity's cycle squad.

Stuart Callison, chief executive of St Andrew's First Aid, said: "For more than six years, Scotmid has been one of our most valuable supporters. The funding we have received from them has enabled us to provide our new volunteers with essential uniforms and equipment, helping them to be easily identifiable when out in the community and to carry out lifesaving duties.

It's important that when the public see a St Andrew's First Aid volunteer in uniform they know they are in the very best hands".

"We hugely appreciate Scotmid's ongoing support as we continue to make available, highly trained, dedicated First Aiders at events across Scotland."

The charity works with a team of 1,100 adult volunteers and over 350 youth volunteers who attend 1,800 events each year. In addition to providing first aid support at Premier League football matches, music concerts, community events and charity races the charity volunteers have played an integral part in helping to run the Covid-19 vaccination centres across the country. Overall, the team contribute 67,000 hours each year to the Scottish community.

Sustainable Scotmid

With the world's eyes focused on Glasgow this November for the COP26 Summit, the Society took the opportunity to promote sustainable habits.

The Membership Team arranged litter picks in our communities and at our Head Office in Newbridge.

The 'Helping Hand' social media campaign encouraged colleagues and elected members to share images of the simple things they do to help the environment.

Examples received included recycling clothes, composting, turning off lights and walking or cycling instead of driving.

The Society has committed to a wide-ranging program of sustainable initiatives including a Zero Waste target and lower CO2 refrigeration.





Store openings signify the beginning of a new chapter for the Society and the store involved. For the Society's Development Team, who manage the project, they are the culmination of a year of hard work and planning to create the best layout, design and product offerings for the local community.

Anyone who has carried out building or renovation work in the past 20 months has faced increased challenges. Government lockdowns and restrictions to stop the spread of coronavirus, changes in labour markets and supply chains caused by Brexit and the global shortage of materials and parts as well as the increasing cost of labour, parts and materials have all had an impact.

The Society's Development Team, which includes representatives from departments across the business, has had to deal with issues that have never been faced before. Under the stewardship of Maurissa Fergusson, Head of Property, Development and Facilities, and Kevin Plant, Head of Food, the team has risen to the challenge and delivered impressive projects.

In March 2020, when the first lockdown was introduced, the Society had two significant projects on site and underway – Bo'ness and

Leven Street in Edinburgh. Works on these projects had to stop. In Bo'ness, the steel frame of the new store and investment units had just been erected and the store was trading from a temporary building. At Leven Street, the front two storey building had been demolished and the store was trading from the back of the store via a temporary access corridor. The Society was grateful to colleagues and customers alike who continued to support these stores during this period.

When work recommenced at these sites later in 2020 the whole world had changed. Contractors ways of working had also changed to reflect Government guidance and regulations. Measures included increased focus on social distancing, access routes, permits to work, PPE, temperature checks, regular sanitising, control of the numbers of tradesmen on site at any one time, welfare facilities, shift patterns and additional cleaning.

It is to the credit of all the teams involved, that we were able to open the new 4500 square foot Bo'ness store in October 2020 and the new store at Leven Street in February 2021. We were also able to market and lease eight new flats above the Leven Street store in May 2021. The new stores have provided the Society with the opportunity to offer to our customers an improved and exciting range.

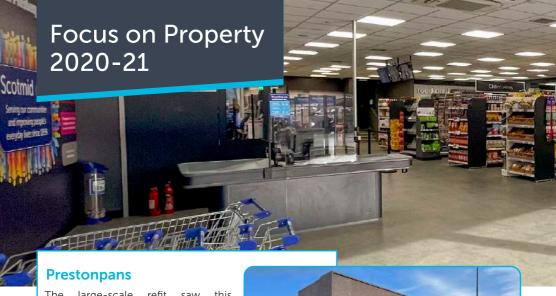
Looking at 2021 the Development Team have continued to mitigate challenges to complete various projects for the Society. See overleaf for more recent projects.











The large-scale refit saw this prominent store undergo major works spanning over a year, recently opening in September 2021. The works included replacement refrigeration, a large extension to the car park and finally structural alteration and refit of the store. The store has been transformed and offers customers a fantastic shopping destination.



New refrigeration installations continued to roll out at several stores including Calderwood (Sept 2020), Armadale (Oct 2020), Balerno (May 2021), Hamilton Place, pictured below (August 2021), Holytown (Sept 2021) and Laurencekirk (Oct 2021). The projects undertaken at many of these stores also involved additional works to change the layout of the stores, to replace kiosks and bakeries, decoration, rebranding and the introduction of new ranges.







Perth

A new trading convenience food store was acquired in September 2021. The refit and rebranding works were fast-tracked and completed in a week so we could open and provide our new customers with an impressive offer.

Reformatting and branding works were undertaken in this project including the addition of a state-of-the-art Butchery counter, an incredible new offer for local customers.

A large-scale Food to Go project was undertaken in June 2021, including the introduction of specialist equipment for Pizza's, Burgers, and evening offers. These new offerings have been a huge success for the store.



Local SupplierOatcakes from Orkney

Stockan's bakery is located in the picturesque, harbour town of Stromness, in the Orkney Islands. A family-owned award winning business, their handmade oatcakes are enjoyed all around the globe.

"Of course there have been changes over the years but what has remained constant is pride in our heritage, great tasting products, a focus on quality and a loyal workforce – many of whom have been with us over 20 years, with some over 40! To keep the skills and experience alive, these employees are busy passing on their knowledge to newer members of the team, including myself." explains Irené Archer, 4th generation co-owner.

As one of the leading Scottish oatcake brands in the UK, they are well known for producing triangle (sector) shape oatcakes. This shape dates back centuries to when oats and water would be mixed together, the dough rolled out thinly like a pancake, cooked on a round griddle over an open fire and then quartered (hence the triangle shape they continue to bake today). In addition to maintaining this traditional shape they continue to print the image of the majestic 449ft 'Old Man of Hoy' sandstone rock stack on the core range, having obtained the trade mark back in 1952.

Stockan's has been supplying Scotmid for many years and they really appreciate the good relationship that has developed. The products that can be found in store are baked full of slow energy releasing wholegrain oats, are naturally high in fibre, contain no artificial colours or flavourings and are suitable for vegans. The oatmeal used in their bestselling oatcakes is either coarse ground for a more crunchy texture or fine milled for an unmistakably light, crisp savoury biscuit.

Traditionally, oatcakes were eaten instead of bread with soup or a nice hearty stew. Today they are still enjoyed this way but can also complement any cheeseboard and are very popular with pâté, smoked salmon, peanut butter and jam. In fact, they go very well with most sweet and savoury toppings.





Aldomak has been in business since 1932, making traditional confectionery in Glasgow. The company still supplies local cafés, hotels and farm shops, but has also branched out into supplying some of the bigger retailers like Scotmid in Scotland.

Aldomak prides itself in sticking to traditional recipes and methods which retain the hand-crafted flavours and profiles customers look for. Aldomak makes Scottish tablet, fudge and macaroon as well as handmade meringues and oat bars. Their Confectious brand has recently

been listed in Scotmid in 150g sharing bags which have been very popular.

"Teaming up with Scotmid has allowed us to push our brand across Scotland, and the Scottish provenance seems to resonate well in their stores." - Aldomak

The Aldomak factory has AA grade hygiene certification which has taken considerable investment over

many years, but this has provided the assurance needed for wider distribution.

Aldomak appreciates the importance of bees and pollination to the food industry everywhere. They have two actively managed hives on their waste ground, which attract a lot of interest from staff, and busy bees!

Scotmid joined nine other retail co-ops across the UK to provide much-needed emergency supplies to co-ops and communities in India during the Covid crisis.

Over £100,000 was donated via the Self Employed Woman's Association; the Co operative Federation in India which works with 106 women's co-ops, enabling them to provide a sustainable livelihood for female workers.

The support given by the UK retail societies will enable seven Indian co-operatives to restart their businesses, buying raw materials and helping re-establish market links. SEWA also used this substantial donation to leverage extra support from corporate donors, securing additional funds for women farmers and a catering co-operative in this way.

The emergency response was coordinated by Co-operatives UK and the Co-operative College.









The Society has recruited more than 70 young people through The Kickstart Scheme and has plans to recruit more into both food and Semichem stores following the news that the scheme is extending until March 2022. Colleagues across the Society are supporting participants to develop transferable skills that are aimed at increasing their chances of sustained employment.

The Kickstart Scheme was announced in July 2020 as part of the Chancellor's Plan for Jobs. The scheme aims to create high-quality paid six-month work placements for young people aged 16 to 24 who are claiming Universal Credit and are at risk of long-term unemployment.

Kickstart candidates complete a full application and selection process including an interview.

Red Pepper & Sweet Potato Soup

- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 large red pepper, chopped
- 1 large sweet potato, peeled and chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed (optional)
- Water, vegetable stock or chicken stock to cover
- Salt and pepper

Method

Bring all ingredients to the boil and simmer until sweet potato is soft. Blend carefully.

Season to taste and serve.

Tomato Soup

- 8 tbsp unsalted butter
- A large onion, cut into wedges
- 2 tins of tomatoes
- 800 ml of water, vegetable stock or chicken stock
- Salt & pepper

Method

Melt butter and add all ingredients

Cook uncovered for 40 minutes

Season to taste

Serve chunky or blend carefully for a smoother consistency

Customise to you own taste

Why not add curry powder or chilli flakes for a little kick! Stir in some creme fraiche to make extra creamy or experiment with fresh herbs like Basil or Coriander for extra fragrance.

Creamy Cauliflower Soup

- 1 head of Cauliflower (approx. 1kg)
- Salt and pepper
- Butter or olive oil (optional)
- Crumbled cheese to top (optional)

Method

Remove cauliflower leaves and tough core

Chop into florets/chunks and rinse

Boil 1.2 litres of salted water

Add cauliflower, bring back to the boil and then cover for around 5 minutes until tender

Blend cooked cauliflower carefully in batches, with enough cooking liquid to create a soup consistency

Add butter or olive oil (optional)

Season to taste and serve with cheese topping

in the oven with olive oil and smoked paprika for an extra burst of flavour.

Scotmid has been partnered with Children's Hospices Across Scotland (CHAS) for a whole year now, and we are delighted with the impact our support has had throughout these last 12 months.

Scotmid staff have continued to show their commitment by taking part in numerous fundraising events; including climbing Ben Nevis (pictured above), walking 10 miles across Edinburgh, braving an intense zip line course and donning their best tartan for the return of the live Kiltwalk in September. It is also thanks to the care and generosity of Scotmid, its members, staff and customers that CHAS has been able to continue supporting families across the country, ensuring that no-one has to face the death of their child alone.

We spoke with Nicki Corrigan, the new Service Manager across Outreach at CHAS. With the support of partners like Scotmid, CHAS was able to fund this role which aims to create an equitable service across the whole of Scotland; focused on collaboration in the community by working alongside local healthcare providers. This role will look to upskill, educate and support care in the community and align palliative care across the whole of Scotland allowing CHAS to support families in their own homes if that's their preference.

Nicki says, "Reach is about being able to support care where and when families need it and in order to achieve this, we need the support from community teams. The pandemic has accelerated and allowed the expansion of

the CHAS at Home service and we realised that many families preferred support in their own homes. To make this a reality, we looked at the structure of the Nursing Team and the Family Support Team and ensured that together, we could be reactive to the needs of families across the service.

"Key to this is ensuring that we can sustain this delivery of care and that's why partners like Scotmid are so important. We want to become a reactive service where we achieve a clear outcome, can respond to all episodes of crisis and provide periods of increased support for families so we can be equitable across the service.

"I want to personally say a big thank you to you for helping make our ambition a reality and helping us reach families across the breadth of the country, providing care in the way that is most suitable for them."

Many people are looking forward to spending Christmas with their loved ones this year and for families with a dying child this is especially important. Families might be experiencing their first Christmas without their child or their last Christmas with their child. Without access to proper support it can also be a lonely and frightening time.

Next year CHAS will be celebrating 30 years since its inception. Over this time, they have opened two hospices, developed and grown a CHAS at Home service, introduced Diana Children's Nurses into hospitals, established Scotland's first ever Supportive and Palliative Care Team and now has a presence at every children's hospital across Scotland. In response to the pandemic, they launched the world's first virtual children's hospice.

As part of their thirtieth, CHAS want to celebrate and recognise the families, staff, volunteers and supporters who have contributed over the years, and look to the future of the organisation, bringing the focus back to their mission to reach every dying child. Their work will never be done no matter how aspirational their ambition - there will always be children with palliative care needs and they need to always be there for them.



Sophie's Story

Now more than ever before, CHAS is determined to reach every single child who needs their help. Scotmid are dedicated to supporting them on that mission so they can continue caring for more families like Sophie's.

Lyndsey, Sophie's mum said: "Harry and I have been really full on when it comes to Soph's care. It came so naturally to us both, just like a parental instinct. Harry sleeps downstairs with her as we were told she'd be most likely to die from having a seizure in her sleep and we want to make sure that someone is there by her side at all times. She'll never be alone.

"Sophie has already exceeded her life expectancy. And she could be here for another ten years so we are focused on making as many memories as possible as a family. You put her to bed at night and don't know if she will be here in the morning. That worry and grief will never stop [but] I'm at one with the fact that this was the life that Sophie was meant to live. And she lives the life she does have to the fullest with the people around her that love everything about her.

"If anything, this last year has showed us all that life is too short to spend time worrying and being miserable. We certainly have our moments, like anyone, but when we are down, we like to play the 'glad game' – we think of all the things in life we are grateful for."
